As I catch my breath from the intense month with two consecutive teams of kiwis, I'm impacted by the privilege it is for us New Zealanders to be part of the great commission in that nation. Unlike NZ, Mongolia does not have a Christian heritage. Most of the believers we minister to there are firstgeneration Christians. Many of them are thrown into leadership positions early on in their faith-journey. These faithful Christ-followers want the rest of their country to hear about Jesus too. And we have the privilege of helping equip them with biblical foundations and with the tools to make disciples in unreached areas.

When I say **we**, I do not just mean those of us who travel to Mongolia. I mean **you** included! **You too** can participate in this disciple-making work, by helping resource the workers. Together, we can make sure they are well trained, have funds to sustain regular trips to remote villages and have audio bibles to give to those who want to learn more about God. Sending Out the Workers

Mendee (pictured above) pastors a church in the town of Ulaangom, and our partners have been mentoring him in the process of church-planting. He first accompanied them on trips into rural villages, observing and participating alongside our partners as they demonstrated how to connect with families, share the gospel effectively and pray for people. And now Pastor Mendee is confidently leading others from his congregation on churchplanting mission trips. Mendee and his church are inspired to make The Great Commission their responsibility regularly travelling beyond their town into the unreached villages of their province (Uvs). They're using other Asian Outreach ministries, like Winter Kits, to help advance their mission. Coming with something to offer, like the possibility of warm jackets and boots for the children, makes building trust and connections easier. It can be a slow process, requiring patience and prayer. But already one family has accepted the message of Jesus. We pray this will be the beginning of nurturing and growing a new church that goes on to be self-sustaining.

the inevitable challenges of leading people. Pastor Ganbaa (pictured above) has benefited greatly from our GCI training, as his journey into pastoring was unexpectedly rapid! Ganbaa was born with clubfoot and found it difficult and painful to walk three kilometres to the closest church. But he didn't allow these health challenges to hinder him from being an active part of the body of Christ. Instead, he dreamed of planting a church right near his home. Ganbaa had also noticed elderly neighbours

vulnerable children to receive Winter Kits and participate in a discipleship course. Within a few weeks of praving for a church building, funds miraculously came together to purchase a small home on the main street. Up to 20 believers are now gathering together on Sundays in this building and recently a kids' church sprung up out of the Winter Kits ministry.

Thankfully Ganbaa has a solid biblical understanding to pass on and can confidently move forward in his new role as a pastor.

In Mongolia, it seems to be true that the harvest is plentiful and the workers are few. Half the population live in rural unreached areas, and yet, when the message of Jesus arrives, many are willing to listen and receive prayer. The workers may be few, but they are passionate and committed! Like Ganbaa. these faithful Christ-followers are willing to reach out to their neighbours. And like Mendee and his team, some are willing to travel and spend nights away from their families regularly, so they can share the good news with unreached people and nurture small groups of new believers. hey say knowledge is power. And that couldn't be truer of our Women's Empowerment Project, which imparts life-changing education to rural Cambodian communities. Without access to the internet and health professionals for information, villagers have huge knowledge gaps, impacting on their wellbeing. Asian Outreach Cambodia's (AOC's) Women's Empowerment Groups provide a space for women to gather, connect, learn and be empowered to make better decisions for themselves and their families. For example, most people are unaware of the risks of human-trafficking and can easily fall victim to opportunists. Also, many women have no idea about their monthly cycle and how it impacts on their fertility, and a lot of families are oblivious to how poor hygiene and sanitation are impacting their health. By running monthly workshops with women, we're filling these knowledge gaps! We're protecting girls from being sold into slavery, helping couples conceive a number of children that they can afford to feed and educate, and giving families strategies that will free them from constant sickness.

AOC's recently appointed project manager, Koemlieng, is preparing now to launch new Women's Empowerment Groups in 2025, but she needs our support to make that happen! As she busily plans and facilitates the workshops, spending long days traveling on dusty roads to reach the villages, us

kiwis will be right alongside her, helping fund the way! And as she visits schools to educate middle-schoolers about puberty, she will distribute gifts that bring dignity and freedom, given by us kiwis! These kits contain knickers and reusable pads and have the power to transform lives (as Sovan Tola testifies, right-column).

"I was always upset about the cost to buy period products. And I have never dared to talk to anyone about health and hygiene, not even my mother. So I would just hide and thought it was okay because it only happened once a month. AOC's programme changed my mindset and made my life a lot easier. The sanitary products are soft and cool, and can be carried anywhere, to school or to the farm. I am so thankful for the training and I'm feeling more confident to speak up and not be shy!"


